

MLA Bibliography Format

Book

author's last name, author's first name. title. city of publication: publisher, date of publication.

Example

Carballo, Jimena. The World of Horses. New York: Basic, 2004.

**When you have more than one author, follow the following format:*

Cortez, Michael and Benjamin Martin. Computer Gamer: The Strategies that Work.

New York: Pocket, 1993.

Journal Article

author's last name, author's first name. "title of the article." Title of Journal (date): page number.

Example

Inoue, Daisuke. "How to Tell Stingy Jokes." Studies in Popular Culture 13.2 (1991):

53-65.

Newspaper or Magazine Article

author's last name, author's first name. "title of the article." name of magazine or newspaper date of magazine: page numbers.

Example

Bustillo, Noel. "Berry Bonds: Homerun King or Steroid King?" Los Angeles Times 15

Nov. 2007: A3.

Book Article or Chapter

author's last name. "title of the article." name of book. editor's name. city of publication: publisher, date. page numbers.

Example

Quiros, Daniela. "Two Sides to Every Story." Human Culture of Teenagers Today.

Ed. Laurence Cardwell. Westport: Greenwood, 2004. 219-223.

Encyclopedia Article (well known reference books)

author's last name. "title of the article." name of the encyclopedia. edition. year.

Example

Lahmann, Eva. "Global Warming." The Encyclopedia Americana. International ed. 1995.

Encyclopedia Article (less familiar reference books)

author's last name. "title of the article." name of the encyclopedia. edition. year.

Example

Aguila, Stephen. "Wii." The World Encyclopedia of Video Games.

Ed. Sebastian Valverde. 2 vols. New York: Chelsea, 2006.

Gale Reference Book (and other books featuring reprinted articles)

Pena, Isabela. "The Interplanetary Ballet Dancer." Saturday Review

17 June 2005: 46. Rpt. in Contemporary Literary Criticism. Ed.

Camille Garnier. Vol. 17. Detroit: Gale Research, 2003. 403.

ERIC Document

author's last name, author's first name. title. location: type of publication, date of publication, ERIC Document Reproduction Service ED number.

Example

Anderson, Brady. Skateboarding: The Next Generation of Skaters. Escazu: Speech

Communication Assn., 2007. ERIC Document Reproduction Service ED364932.

Website

To cite a general website:

Name of website. editor(s) of website. date of electronic publication. Associated institution. date of accesses URL.

Example

BBC on the Internet. 2007. British Broadcasting Company. 17 Nov. 2007

<<http://www.bbc.com>>.

To cite a specific article from a website:

author's last name, first name. "Title of the article," Name of the web site. editors of the website. date of electronic publication. Associated institution. date of accesses URL.

Example

Blaser, Richard. "Is Democracy Really a Democracy" Young Rising Democrats Abroad.

2004. Queens University. 8 Oct. 2002, <[\[www.queens.edu/campusorg/yrda/DS9/ep/503r.html\]\(http://www.queens.edu/campusorg/yrda/DS9/ep/503r.html\)>.](http://</p></div><div data-bbox=)

Newspaper or Magazine Article on the Internet

author's last name, author's first name. "title of the article." name of the magazine.
date: URL.

Example

Alers, Ian. "The Earth is Getting Warmer, but Don't Worry." Natural Science Jan. 2007:

<http://naturalscience.com/Earth>.

Interviews

Name of the interviewee and year of interview, position of the interviewee (if relevant),
"Subject/title of interview," interviewed by, transcript of interview, date of interview.

Example

Katz, Steve 2007, Former Pan American Game cyclist champion, "Life on the Road,"

interviewed by Andrea Gil, transcript of interview, 21 November.

Points to Remember

1. Be in the habit of writing down the bibliographic details as soon as you decide that a resource will be useful.
2. Where no author is known enter the work in your reference section under the title with the year following.
3. If there are 3 or more authors, their names should be cited in the order in which they appear on the title page.
4. For clarity indent the second line of a reference in order to make the author's name or title clear. Make the indenting consistent throughout.
5. If the publisher and the place of publication are not known use n.pub., n.p.
6. In general, references are listed in alphabetical order.
7. Email addresses should never be cited without the permission of the owner of the address.
